As USPHS officers, we should all take action to be prepared for unexpected natural disasters.

Family and Friends

- Be aware of disasters that could affect your area by reviewing disaster history data (tornadoes, floods, hurricanes, earthquakes, wildfires):

- Stay informed with reliable emergency alerts:

- Make an evacuation and shelter plan:

- Map out your evacuation route in advance and practice with your friends and family
- Have a communication plan in place – your family and friends are unlikely to be in same location when a disaster strikes. <https://www.ready.gov/make-a-plan>
- Know what types of shelters are available in your area and when you should seek shelter or stay put

- Insurance and Property Documentation

- Ensure your insurance coverage is appropriate for the disaster risks in your area

- Be neighborly

- After disaster strikes, 46% of individuals will rely on their neighbors for up to 72 hours

- First one on the scene

- The first few minutes in a life-threatening emergency are the most critical
