
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# APAOC Chair's Corner

of the Surgeon General's (OSG) priorities, and Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) communities.

During the APAOC General Member Meeting on February 1st, I outlined three overarching goals for the year ahead:

- Enhance community

The Commissioned Corps is currently undergoing significant changes, making officer support and development more important than ever before. APAOC has a great reputation in this area, demonstrated by our successful leadership summits over the years. We are committed to continuing this focus on education and training sessions, mentoring

programs, and developing resource documents that help officers succeed in their public health careers. As a chartered advisory group in the OSG, we will empower members to step up and take lead on various officership activities. Whether it's volunteering at a subcommittee or a workgroup, leading community events, or bringing up your ideas and perspectives, every contribution makes a difference. APAOC's success relies on our collective leadership and dedication. Just in short few months into 2023, we have already accomplished the following:

- Subcommittee (SC) successfully held the first educational session on March 3rd on the "Overview of CDC's International Experience and Technical Assistance (IETA) Program". LT Jiali He, alternate to the SC Chair LCDR Jason Tu, did a masterful job on planning and moderating the session with 68 participants eager to expand their public health expertise globally.
- Career Development and Advancement SC launched the 2023 APAOC mentoring program with a new survey tool to help match suitable mentors and mentees.
- APAOC held our first ever
   Virtual Connect Session on
   March 31st to engage in an open
   dialog to share experiences and
   learn about recent USPHS

deployments. This will be a series to engage officers in sharing experience on various topics.

APAOC's commitment to community engagement has been one of our greatest strengths. Our position allows us to represent both our communities in the Corps and the Corps in our communities. Thanks to the hard work of our Community Engagement Workgroup (CEWG), we have established a robust process and structure that empowers APAOC officers to lead community-based public health initiatives under the OSG's umbrella. The Chinese Culture and Community Service Center (CCACC) Health and Community Service Fair in Gaithersburg, Maryland (see pages 13-14 for further details) and the Out of Darkness Walk Resources Fair in Washington DC in collaboration with PACE-DC (see pages 18-19 for further details) are two examples in which they set a great precedence for us to follow. Since the start of 2023, CEWG has already completed four community outreach events in four different regions, including two events in celebration of the lunar new year and community wellness (a community 5K in Shoreline WA and a health booth at a community event organized by the Dallas Chinese Community Center, see pages 16-17 for further details).

With the recent success of the Healthy Mind Initiative Lesson Plan, APAOC is again influencing the Corps at large and is well positioned to continue spearheading the community outreach activities covering various OSG priorities such as addressing youth mental health, disseminating health information, conducting USPHS recruitment, and providing clinical services to communities with language barriers.

Our efforts also extend to enhancing diversity and AAPI cultural awareness within the Corps. The Public Relation SC hosted the third annual virtual Lunar New Year celebration event on February 17th, with an impressive turnout of 114 registrants and 90 live attendees from various professional categories and agencies (see page 15 for further details). We are currently planning multiple events for the upcoming AAPI Heritage Month in May, as we continue to serve as a vital resource for our communities and the Corps.

Since the establishment of the AAPI Health Equity Workgroup in 2022, we have been making significant progress including:

• Topic in Public Health lecture in the Conversations in Equity Series on January 20th on the topic of "Health Disparities among AAPI Populations: An Overview and Examples in Cancer Health" by CAPT (ret.) Graydon Yatabe and LT Jin Qin, with over 350 attendees.

- Two presentations at the 2023 AMSUS Annual Conference on February 15th
  - a) "It Takes a Village: Changing the Narrative of Youth Mental Health in Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Populations" by LCDR Doan Singh and LCDR Ruby Leong.
  - b) "APAOC's Efforts in

    Populations" by LCDR
    Evelyn Hong and LCDR
    Doan Singh.
- Development of a partnership with the NIH AANHPI Health Scientific Interest Group in supporting the planning of its Health Research Conference in May to directly address one of the HHS's five goals under the National Strategy of the White House Initiative on AANHPI.


## 2023 APAOC Senior Advisor & Executive Committee

**CAPT Juliette Taylor**, PharmD, MBA, RAC, BCPP currently serves as the Senior Policy Advisor in the Division of Psychiatry (DP). ## **MOLC Representative**





# TDY Experience at Crownpoint Healthcare Facility

The Indian Health Service Crownpoint Health Care Facility serves a population of 20,000 Navajo people. The Crownpoint Pharmacy Department consists of a main pharmacy department, two satellite pharmacies, and an inpatient pharmacy which supports a small inpatient unit and an Emergency Department. There are several pharmacist-led clinics which cover management of substance abuse, hypertension, anticoagulation, diabetes, hyperlipidemia, pain, and tobacco cessation. The Pharmacist Clinician credential (PhC), held by several pharmacists at Crownpoint, is unique to New Mexico pharmacists. The PhC credential allows pharmacist clinicians to collaborate with physicians to provide certain primary care and specialty care services, including prescribing medications, diagnosing certain disease states, performing physical exams and ordering lab tests. Furthermore, New Mexico Pharmacist Clinicians can register for DEA licenses. Currently, there is one Pharmacist Clinician at Crownpoint managing the pharmacist-run pain clinic who can prescribe controlled medications.

#### **TDY Pharmacist Responsibilities:**

From February 1st to 17th, 2023, I completed a pharmacy TDY at Crownpoint Healthcare Facility in Crownpoint, NM. My primary responsibilities included:

- Verifying prescriptions: I verified medication orders reviewing for the correct patient's name, medication (via pill image), directions, quantity, and dosing for pediatric, adult, and those with renal- or hepaticimpairment.
- 2. Counseling patients: I counseled patients on newly prescribed medications and changes in dose and dosing frequency to current medications. In the Indian Health Service, patient counseling is required for all new medications or changes to current medications. There are two dedicated counseling rooms in Crownpoint pharmacy which provide patient privacy.
- 3. Filling controlled medications: Crownpoint pharmacy utilizes ScriptPro, Pyxis, and Eyecon to label, fill, count, verify, and store controlled medications. All narcotic prescriptions are double counted. Patient's prescription bags are stored in the Pyxis and recorded on a log sheet.
- 4. Dispensing controlled medications: When patients or their proxies show up at the pharmacy, their prescription bags are retrieved from the Pyxis and logged out from the log sheet. Patients and their proxies must present their driver's license to the pharmacy staff; their driver's license numbers and expiration dates are recorded in ScriptPro.

#### Staff Housing:

TDY pharmacists are typically housed in facility quarters. These houses are simple, but offer basic furnishings and appliances.

#### Places to Visit:

I visited the Gallup flea market in Gallup, NM. Vendors sold local cuisine such as fry bread, mutton stew, posole, tamale, blue corn mash, Navajo cake, etc. I was delighted to partake in trying as much food as my stomach would allow! There were many artisans selling Native American paintings, pottery, turquoise and beaded jewelry, clothing, blankets and leatherwork. Needless to say, I bought some souvenirs to take home with me.

For those who enjoy photography and beautiful landscapes, I recommend the Durango and Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad. I took the Cascade Canyon winter train and experienced magnificent views of the Animas River and snowclad peaks of the Rocky Mountains as I traveled from Durango, CO to Cascade Canyon, CO.

The Sandia Peak Tramway in Albuquerque, NM, is another attraction not to be missed. I took the tram which ascended up to the 10,378-foot crest of the Sandia Mountain to experience breathtaking views. For those who enjoy skiing, you can also ski down the Sandia Mountain.

Overall, I had an enjoyable time during my TDY at Crownpoint. The pharmacy staff were welcoming and patient as they showed me the ropes. ## Collaboration with the Asian American and Pacific Islander Community to Promote the Surgeon General's Health Initiatives

On October 8th, 2022, LCDR Tramara Dam and LT Kerui Xu led a diverse team of 12 United States Public Health Service (USPHS) Commissioned Corps Officers from different professional categories to support the 2022 Chinese Culture and Community Service Center (CCACC) Health and Community Service Fair in Gaithersburg, Maryland. This is an annual event that is organized by CCACC to provide free clinical services to members of the community. CCACC is a non-profit organization serving the greater Washington community to improve the quality of life and well-being of the Chinese American community. CCACC hosts health fair events to help disadvantaged residents with low income, no health insurance, and no access to healthcare due to language barriers or cultural differences. USPHS officers, state and federal government agencies, health fair vendors, sponsors, local healthcare providers, community partners, and CCACC volunteers participated in the event to provide health services to the community.

The goal of the CCACC Health and Community Service Fair was to provide free preventative care to members of the community. The event offered free vaccinations, Hepatitis B screening, blood pressure screening, body mass index screening, body fat testing, fasting glucose testing, bone density testing, eye exams, hearing exams, and mental health screening. Additionally, some attendees received complimentary blood work which included a complete blood count, a comprehensive metabolic panel, and a lipid panel. USPHS officers provided public health education, clinical services as well as USPHS recruitment materials to over 350 members of the community. The officers presented on public health topics impacting the community such as mental health awareness and the Surgeon General's priorities, including safety in the sun and healthy, active living.

Suicide is the leading cause of death in Asian American and Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander (AANHPI) youths between the ages of 15 to 24 years old and the suicide rate continues to increase in this population. The Asian Pacific American Officers Committee (APAOC) established the Healthy Mind Initiative (HMI) in 2018 to promote youth mental health awareness in AANHPI communities, decrease the stigma around mental health, and inspire parents and youths to seek help. Through the collaborative efforts of APAOC and Prevention through Active Community Engagement (PACE), another chartered group in the Office of the Surgeon General, a HMI Lesson Plan was developed and approved by the Surgeon General in the Fall of 2022, making this a nationwide initiative to support and educate AANHPI communities. During the CCACC event, the APAOC team presented the HMI Lesson Plan to the public and introduced the new 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, specifically, the purpose of the lifeline and how it can save lives. LCDR Dam was the lead presenter of the HMI Lesson Plan and this was her first HMI event using the newly approved Lesson Plan.

Many attendees stopped by the USPHS booth to express their gratitude and appreciation for the services provided by the USPHS officers. The CCACC Health and Community Service Fair allowed officers to have a direct impact in improving public health and building relationships with the local Chinese American community while also increasing visibility of the USPHS. The USPHS officers look forward to supporting more health fairs in the near future!

# Asian Pacific American Officer Committee – Community Engagement Workgroup Events Starting the Year Off Right!

In honor of the Asian American tradition and heritage, the Asian Pacific American Officer Committee (APAOC) and the Greater Texas Commissioned Officers Association (GTCOA) collaborated with the Dallas Chinese Community Center (DCCC) to organize a community outreach event at the Richardson Chinatown Plaza on Saturday, January 28th, 2023, in Richardson, Texas. In addition to blood pressure screenings and health education (e.g., importance of routine follow up with healthcare providers and maintaining/establishing a healthy diet and exercise plan), the team provided "goodie" bags filled with healthy crackers, reduced fat cheese dips, and water bottles to promote smart-choice snack options. The USPHS education booth was staffed with six USPHS officers, divided into two 3-hour shifts, providing coverage for the event from 10 AM through 3 PM. The officers assisted a total of 53 visitors, with 18 signing up for blood pressures readings. The officers engaged 45 additional visitors by providing health information, sharing cooking resources or answering health-related questions.

In addition to providing community health outreach at the event, the officers enjoyed the festivities and learned more about the culture. The event's agenda included various traditional Chinese/Vietnamese performances, including Origami, Chinese Yo-Yo, and Red En-

In the United States, suicide attempt rates have increased over the years, especially among Asian American populations. Suicide is a serious public health problem that has lasting harmful effects in our communities. The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention coordinates the Out of the Darkness Community Walk and Resource Fair events across the United States, bringing communities together to raise awareness and openly discuss mental health and suicide. These events allow participants to honor and remember the loss of their loved ones and connect with others affected by suicide.

The Out of the Darkness Community Walk and Resource Fair event was held on October 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2022, in Washington, D.C. In a collaborative effort, 30 United States Public Health Service (USPHS) Commissioned Corps officers from the Asian Pacific American Officers Committee (APAOC) and the Prevention through Active Community Engagement (PACE) hosted a booth and provided educational materials on public health, USPHS recruitment, the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, and COVID-19 fact sheets. The APAOC team, led by LCDR Tramara Dam, also presented the Healthy Mind Initiative (HMI) Lesson Plan to 325 community members who visited the USPHS booth, covering the current data on youth mental health as well as the new 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline hotline dedicated to suicide prevention by providing support to anyone in emotional distress.

The pandemic significantly changed American lives with social distancing which prevented officers from supporting community events. LCDR Dam commented, "the pandemic has changed me significantly over the past few years. I have learned to appreciate life even more and really value the opportunity to support the community." The officers who participated and supported this event, were honored to serve and reunite with the community after many years of social distancing. The Out of the Darkness Community Walk and Resource Fair enabled officers to provide public health education and mental health awareness to protect, promote, and advance the health and safety of the nation.
