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
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
APAOC Chair's Corner

Flemming Award, which recognizes exceptional federal employees with 3-15 years of federal service for performing outstanding service in the fields of applied science and engineering, basic science, leadership and management, legal achievement, and social science. Presentation on APAOC's Efforts to Address Hate Crimes in AAPI Community



On May 24, 2022, the Asian Pacific American Officers Committee (APAOC) was honored in show-casing the multiple activities performed by the Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Cultural Support Work Group (WG) at the 2022 United States Public Health Service (USPHS) Scientific and Training Symposium (Symposium) in Phoenix, AZ. This year the Symposium's Poster Session focused on the measurable impacts achieved by the USPHS Commissioned Corps officers with public health partners and how these efforts advance the health and safety of our nation. The APPI WG was selected to host a poster presentation titled, "APAOC's Efforts to Address Racial Discrimination, Hate Crimes, and Mental Health Disparities in the AAPI Community" during this grand event. The poster highlighted the history of AAPI racism in the United States, APAOC's Officers' experiences with discrimination, hate crimes, and mental health, our efforts in addressing these issues and disparities in AAPI community, and lessons learned to prepare for future initiatives.

This year the Symposium had a total of 27 posters displayed throughout the event. LCDR Doan Singh and LCDR Tramara Dam represented the WG and presented the poster presentation to over 1000 attendees. LCDRs Singh and Dam presented on the content of the poster, spotlighting the accomplishments of the WG that published a resource paper, drafted a White paper with Black Commissioned Officers Advisory Group, hosted three round table discussions to include other Chartered Minority Advisory Groups (CMAGs) and Sexual Orientation and Gender Diversity Advisory Group, presented with the United States (U.S) Department of Health and Human Services Office of Minority Health and Assistant Secretary for Administration, and presented at the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States annual meeting. In addition, they showcased APAOC's future initiatives to

include presentations with other CMAGs, Collaboration with Minority Officer Liaison Council on a cultural mentorship program and increase community outreach at different parts of the U.S. to increase mental health awareness and to normalize mental health treatment.

APAOC continues to create an all-inclusive environment that celebrates the Commissioned Corps and APAOC diverse backgrounds. We appreciate all the attendees for attending the poster presentation and we believed that by bringing awareness and resources to the communities, together we can prevent and stop hate crimes.

The 2nd Annual Asian American and Pacific Island (AAPI) Heritage Month Celebration

On 12th May 2022, the Asian Pacific American Officers Committee (APAOC) hosted the 2nd annual Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) heritage month celebration. This year's theme was centered on, **Celebrating AAPI Members Serving in the Uniformed Services**. Approximately 80 uniformed officers representing several federal agencies were in attendance during this virtual event. LCDR Ruby Leong, Chair, APAOC, opened the event and introduced the keynote speaker.

The 2022 keynote speaker was Major General (MG) Lapthe C. Flora, U.S. Army, Special Assistant to the Director, Army National Guard in Arlington, VA. MG Flora provided an inspiring life story that encompassed his personal life and his professional career. During his speech he touched on a wide range of issues currently faced by the AAPI community. He provided valuable insights on experience as an AAPI officer, motivation to serve, and shared wisdom.

MG Flora spoke about his early childhood and growing up in conflict-ridden Vietnam. He detailed the challenges and obstacles for survival faced by his family. After his father died during the Vietnam war, he fled with his siblings and lived several years in the jungles of Vietnam to escape the communist regime who took over the country. He went on to speak about his life journey; how he escaped from his homeland to south Asia, arrived in the U.S. in the early 1980s as a refugee, pursued his education to graduate with a bachelor's degree from Virginia Military Institute, received his U.S. Army commissioning with the Virginia National Guard through the ROTC program, and has served in every staff position with his battalion before promotion to Major General.

As to the experience as an AAPI officer, MG Flora said that his experience over the last 35 years in the U.S. has been overwhelmingly positive. MG Flora spoke about the motivation to serve. He stated that he has two reasons why he chose to serve. First, he said that he owes this country a great debt, a debt that is "infinitely larger" than he is ever capable to re-pay. Second reason, he said was the struggles that he faced in his early life in Vietnam during the war, and how fortunate he is to have had the opportunity made available in this country.

On the topic of shared wisdom, MG Flora alerted us to remember that our country is divided and asked us to remember that there are external factors and adversaries trying their level best to keep us divided. He encouraged us to work with our respective communities and to help each other work through the divisiveness and challenges faced by our country. He encouraged us to work towards uniting the country.

MG Flora concluded his talk by thanking the APAOC leadership for inviting him and for providing the opportunity to talk about his service to this great country. Following MG Flora's speech, LCDR Kathleen Tisdale continued the celebration to present the history of AAPI officers who honorably served in the uniformed services for over 200 years. Most notably, detailed statistics of AAPI demographics from the Uniformed Services was presented. LCDR Tisdale reiterated that according to the U.S. census, AAPIs are the fastest growing racial group in the United States. Another highlight of this session was a brilliant video presentation summarizing the contribution of Asian Americans who made military history and interesting facts about AAPI in the Uniformed Services. CAPT Joy Lee continued the session by briefly mentioning the names and notably contributions of several former and currently services officers of AAPI descent. CAPT Lee highlighted several AAPI trailblazer leaders who served in the United States Public Health Service that included RADM (ret.) Samuel Lin, RADM (ret.) Kenneth Moritsugu, RADM (ret.) Robin Ikeda, CAPT (ret.) Allan Lock, and the currently serving 21st Surgeon General (SG) and America's Doctor, VADM Vivek Murthy. Noting that the SG, VADM Murthy played a key role in the administration's response to many daunting healthcare issues, including the Covid-19 pandemic.

LCDR Doan Singh stated the mission of the AAPI Cultural Support Workgroup to bring awareness about racial discrimination, provide education and resources, and actions on how to address racial discrimination and hate crimes. Subsequently, a brief introduction of the current working group members was provided and an overview of noteworthy activities since the group's inception in April 2021. LCDR Singh spotlighted the various future initiatives for the cultural workgroup and provided the attendees with information on how to get involved.

CAPT Juliette Taylor, Senior Advisor to APAOC, provided the closing remarks, thanking Major General Lapthe Flora for sharing his personal story and wisdom with the group and presented him with an official APAOC commemorative coin. She emphasized to the attendees that MG Flora is living proof for immigrants who migrated to this country hoping to live the American Dream and contributed to something bigger for their families and for the country.

CAPT Taylor closed the event with the following quote that resonated perfectly with the theme of the event, "Bravery isn't facing something you knew you could vanquish...Bravery is facing the impossible and saying, what's next? May you have renewed energy and ask yourself, what's next?"

AMCP Student Recruitment Presentation at Ole Miss

On March 3rd, 2022, three officers from Crownpoint Service Unit (CPSU) were invited to speak at a virtual presentation to students at an Academy of Managed Care Pharmacy Student Chapter meeting at the University of Mississippi (Ole Miss). Representing USPHS and IHS through a group of diverse female leaders- LCDR Kali Autrey, LT Adena Yau, and LT Jannet Peroti spoke about their personal career progression, commissioning into USPHS, and current roles.

LT Adena Yau is originally from Queens, New York and attended St. John's University for pharmacy school. After graduation, she pursued a PGY-1 residency at CPSU and was commissioned into the USPHS in the same year. Since then, she has remained at CPSU and taken on additional roles such as adjunct faculty at Rutgers University, residency and student preceptor, and Antimicrobial Stewardship Program Pharmacy Lead. During the event, LT Yau discussed the Junior Commissioned Officer Student Training and Extern Program (JRCOSTEP) and the Senior Commissioned Officer Student Training and Extern Program (SRCOSTEP), including the application process, duration, expectations, and benefits. She described her personal experience completing a JRCOSTEP at the IHS Crow Agency in Montana. LT Yau also spoke about the experiential programs offered to students by various agencies (e.g., Federal Bureau of Prisons and Food and Drug Administration) and the robust student program at their service unit. Lastly, she provided an overview of the PGY-1 and PGY-2 programs offered at IHS sites nationwide.

LT Jannet Peroti relocated to New Mexico from Stone Mountain, Georgia and attended pharmacy school at South University in Savannah, Georgia. She initially came to CPSU as a civilian pharmacist in 2019 and commissioned into the USPHS in 2021. Her current roles include pharmacy lead in

charge of ensuring completion of unit inspections, residency and student coordinator, University of the Sciences preceptor, Pharmacy and Therapeutics (P&T) Committee pharmacy representative, and pharmacy Point of Sale (POS) lead. During the presentation, she discussed the IHS mission and goals, local IHS operations, and the progressive nature of clinical pharmacy practice within IHS. She also elaborated on the requirements and process of obtaining a New Mexico Pharmacist Clinician (PhC) license, including the disease states most commonly managed by Pharmacist Clinicians at CPSU. PhCs in New Mexico have the option of completing additional requirements to obtain a Drug Enforcement Administration license for prescribing controlled substances.

LCDR Kali Autrey is from Kimball, Nebraska and graduated from the University of Wyoming School of Pharmacy. She began her federal and IHS career as a civilian pharmacist before commissioning in 2017. At her local duty site, her current roles include Pharmacist Clinician, residency and student preceptor, and P&T Committee Secretary. She presented on the history of USPHS, roles of pharmacists within various agencies, and emergency response deployments, including her personal deployment experience in response to COVID-19. Students asked questions regarding opportunities to participate at various agencies as a student, JR/ SRCOSTEP, resident, or newly graduated pharmacist. Students also inquired about the extent to which Pharmacist Clinicians could practice independently at their site and within the state, and about other agencies or sites that have a similar level of advanced practice opportunities. The virtual event was a success, and pharmacy students from Ole Miss left with a better understanding of the opportunities within the USPHS and IHS.

My Unique Start to Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experience: A CMS Perspective

When it came time to decide where I wanted to complete my Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experiences (APPEs), I was apprehensive, but excited. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) immediately caught my eye, as my personal experiences have been focused on the community realm of pharmacy, and to have the opportunity to explore such a unique realm of our profession piqued my interest. At my first encounter with CDR Jerry Zee, I was given detailed insight on what the rotation was going to entail and what my future may look like.

During my initial days, I was exposed to core aspects of Medicare to build my understanding and later observed how they were applied to pharmacy billing. This became relevant with CMS meetings, and Medicare Part C & D audits I observed. This new setting allowed me to see how pharmacists operate in a regulatory role. I found it rewarding to learn how certain decisions are made and how problems are resolved when it comes to prescription drugs and health insurance.

This was also unique since this setting involved interactions with team members with different scopes of practice across the United States. This ultimately created an interactive environment where varying perspectives came together for the common goal of ensuring patients receive the best care.

Another aspect that is appealing about CMS is the work environment and opportunities offered. While attending multiple webinars, I was exposed to ideas that emphasized positivity and coming together as a whole. For example, this was done by discussing the importance of mental health, especially while being in a remote setting, and ensuring employees were still able to work together efficiently. Furthermore, CMS' goal is to ensure that their employees are receiving any accommodations they require, even while working remotely. I found this enlightening since I witnessed how each employee is truly valued. Other webinars included focusing on pharmacy board certifications or continuing education trainings. I found this to be beneficial, as it not only refreshed my memory, but continued to prepare me for my future rotations and career.

Overall, I am leaving this rotation with a new perspective and inspiration to continue to explore the various non-traditional settings where pharmacists are able to play a vital role in improving patient care. I've learned that a pharmacist's career is not limited and that there are many, growing opportunities, whether it be within the managed-care setting or the United States Public Health Service (USPHS) Commissioned Corps where underserved populations may be aided. It has also emphasized the importance of looking for new opportunities, and networking at any chance. This ultimately brings growth and continues to create more opportunities not only for my academic career, but for my professional career as well.

Redwoods

Wildfire haze on way to the hospital

The summer of 2021 was a challenging period for northern California because of uncontrolled wild-fires threatening the redwoods, national parks, and many outlying communities. One community, the Hoopa Valley Tribe, located in northeastern Homboldt county, not only had to deal with sporadic spontaneous wildfires, but also had to deal with a COVID-19 outbreak. The Hupa people are a close-knit community and many are employed by the local K'ima:w Medical Center. As a result of becoming a COVID-19 hotspot, many staff were quarantined and needed urgent assistance to operate the hospital, manage the hospital's drive through testing center, and set up and operate community drive through vaccination sites.

In August-September 2021, 6 USPHS officers were deployed for 30 days to staff the small medical center. The cadre consisted of two physicians, two nurses, one clinical psychologist, and one pharmacist. Being the pharmacist on the team, my role was to staff the ambulatory pharmacy because the chief pharmacist and the lead pharmacy technician had COVID-19 and were quarantined for at least two weeks. The pharmacy, under normal staffing conditions, has two pharmacists and 6 technicians and fills over 100 prescriptions per day. My daily activities included attending the hospital's leadership meeting, participating in patient case discussions, planning for setting up and operating COVID-19 vaccination drive through clinics, and staffing the pharmacy. One of the notable pharmacy roles was assisting the clinical team in implementing opioid prescription controls and educating patients about opioid addiction.

I also participated in two COVID-19 vaccination community drive through clinics. My role was to reconstitute and draw up vaccine doses, while the USPHS nurses and physicians administered the vaccines. We provided much needed patient counseling to educate the community on the importance of getting vaccinated.

Hoopa, CA, is a very beautiful and scenic part of the state and I am honored to have deployed to K'ima:w Medical Center and provide pharmacy assistance and serve the Hoopa Valley Tribe in a time of urgent need.
