**Topic:** How to Become Board Certified Through the American Board of General

Dentistry

## **Background:**

 General dentists may seek board certification through the <u>American Board of General Dentistry</u> (ABGD).

- Board certification through the ABGD recognizes great knowledge and accomplishment in the complex area of general dentistry.
- To become board certified in general dentistry, the candidate must pass a written and an oral examination.
- There are three different entry points to qualify for application to be considered educationally qualified for the examination process through the ABGD.
  - Successful completion of a 2-year accredited AEGD or GPR
  - Successful completion of a 1-year accredited AEGD or GPR + 600 CDE hours
     \* CDE will require documentation of minimum hours required in each subject area and
     200 hours in participation courses
  - Mastership in the Academy of General Dentistry
- Once determined educationally qualified, the candidate may apply for the written examination. The written examination is offered twice a year and is a 6-hour exam consisting of 300 multiple choice questions.
- Once the candidate has successfully challenged the written examination, the candidate may apply for the oral examination. The oral examination is offered once a year and focuses on case diagnosis and treatment planning. A candidate must pass the oral examination within five years of achieving the board eligible status upon passing the written examination.

- Board certification through the ABGD is a prestigious recognition of extensive knowledge in comprehensive dental care, validating the dentist's knowledge, skill and experience for diagnosis and delivery of quality patient care.
- There are multiple opportunities in the USPHS where you may apply your new knowledge e.g.
  clinical director of a program, participation in credentials and accreditation committees, hospital
  privileges for advanced care, clinical faculty/education role in academic environments, program
  director of a GPR/AEGD residency, clinical quality improvement programs
- As a board certified general dentist you can continue in the clinical track while pursing projects and leadership roles that improve oral health in the community
- Board certified general dentists qualify for the <u>Comprehensive Dentistry Retention Bonus Rate</u> and the Board Certified Incentive Pay
