Topic: How to Become a Dental Public Health Specialist

Background:

• Dental Public Health (DPH) is currently one of twelve dental specialties.

- o The American Board of Dental Public Health incorporated in 1950
- There are several accredited Dental Public Health Residencies
- There are two options for dentists to become <u>board eligible</u> in DPH − 1) MPH then DPH residency or 2) Combined MPH/DPH Program
- To become board certified in DPH the candidate must pass a four-section evaluation consisting of a written report, oral examination, written examination, and an assigned problem

Part-time Education Process:

1. Identify an education program that offers part-time training option:

- 2. Complete HHS Form 520 Outside Work Activity and submit it for Agency approval
- 3. Consider using the GI Bill for tuition and fees
- 4. Create a memo stating that the federal government is not sponsoring you. Specifically note that you are self-paying tuition/fees and you are not using official duty time to complete coursework. This should be signed by the immediate supervisor and preferably the next level supervisor as well. For a Commissioned Officer, this should be sent to the payroll technician at CC HQ.

Benefits and Career Opportunities:

- DPH training broadens your perspective on how to approach oral health topics at the local, regional, and national level
- There are multiple opportunities to apply your new knowledge e.g. clinical quality improvement programs, oral health surveillance, and health promotion/disease prevention programs
- As a DPH specialist you can continue in the clinical track while pursing projects to improve oral health in the community (e.g. access to dental care) or pursue DPH-specific career opportunities.
- Board eligible DPH specialists qualify for the <u>Public Health Dentistry Retention Bonus Rate</u>;
 Board certified DPH specialist also qualify for <u>Board Certified Incentive Pay</u>
