Since 1798, men and women have served on the front lines protecting our nation's public health in what is today known as the *Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service*. We trace our origin to the U.S. Marine Hospital Service, implemented to protect against the spread of diseases from sailors who returned from foreign ports, and maintained the health of new immigrants.

Who We Are

The Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service is one of the eight uniformed services, and is the only one dedicated solely to protecting America's public health:

- Led by the Assistant Secretary for Health and U.S. Surgeon General
- Composed of nearly 6,100 full-time, highly qualified public health officers and
- Specialties include: physicians, dentists, nurses, pharmacists, clinical and rehabilitation therapists, dieticians, engineers, environmental health and health service officers, scientists, and veterinarians.
